OUR SPEAKERS

Jonathan Cooper was educated at Belmarsh High Security Grammar School, where he was Captain of Rickets and First Reserve Senior Praeposter of the Upper North Long Cloisters. He now teaches Lat. at Papplewick School in Ascot (except on race days, when he has a pitch – "no bet too small" – near the Winner's Enclosure). He also oversees the Bibliomaniacs, who are the youngest antiquarian booksellers in England, Europe, the World, the Universe, Space.

Hilary Clare read Modern History at St Hugh's College, Oxford and subsequently trained as an archivist at the University of North Wales, Bangor. After a few years working in that field she became a teacher, and later a professional genealogist. An interest is children's books in general led to specializing in girls' school stories, and also in the Victorian writer Charlotte Mary Yonge.

Following a career editing parenting and early education magazines, Lesley Delaney studied for an MA in Children's Literature at Roehampton University. She received an AHRC collaborative award to research the development of the nursery reading market from the late eighteenth century through to the beginning of the twentieth century at University College London and the Victoria and Albert Museum, receiving her PhD in 2012.

Robert Kirkpatrick read many books at school, but was denied a place at university by lamentable A Level results. He has been the Secretary of the CBHS for more years than he cares to remember. He has written several books, (two of which were Harvey Darton Award winners, hem hem) since taking early retirement from his job as a Welfare Benefits Adviser in 2007.


